Fishing For Litter in Ireland

- Since 2015 420 T of marine litter retrieved by fishing vessels.
- Nationally 12 ports, 233 vessels, 1169 crew registered
- waste characterisation on:
 - Fishing for Litter (passively fished waste)
 - Galley Waste




RECORD

Analysis of Marine Litter retrieved














Overall Profile of Vessel Based Waste


Survey of 12 Ports


Do you have a waste management plan (waste reception and handling plan) in place?













5. What type of waste contract(s) do you have?






10. What system is in place in your port for fishing vessels to dispose of waste?

- both 1 and 2 above




14. Have you conducted a review of how the new regulations affect your port?



Ideal Scenario

- Consistent national waste management system for all ports (including reporting)
- Facilities for municipal, process and hazardous wastes
- Maximise the availability of resources locally (e.g. metal, wood) as well as internationally (retired nets)
 - Should minimise more FFL being generated
- Facilitate and reward those bringing in historic FFL
- Track and monitor the types of FFL found
- Improve on-board waste segregation inline with new waste management services
- Reduces costs for ports, and vessels alike





Ireland's only approved farm plastics recycling compliance scheme


- Responsible for recycling over <u>250,000 tonnes</u> of farm plastics waste
- Cost effective compliance to members and a comprehensive recycling service to farmers.
- Set up by producers (not-for profit) in response to (1997/2001) legislation
 - Board good mix of producers, distributors, IFA, farmers + legal/finance (stakeholders + governance)
 - Members (~ 37). Staff (~4).
 - Self- declaration local authorities enforce with support from IFFPG compliance officer audits (key 6-7 / 3 yrs)
- Cost Considerations
 - Levy ~€100/tonne. ~ €2.50 €3.00 per roll of wrap (€80/roll)

- ~ 90% of what IFFPG collect is wrap (LLDPE).
- Some netting (HDPE) difficult to shred (thermal treatment)
- Recycling market collapsed when China stopped. European sector 3-5 years away
- Feed modulation (e.g. PET bottles 30% RC target) should help market return in time

Commentary

Unique challenges exist in Fishing Gear Supply chain

- Little apparent agreement on scale of the issue
 - Or potential supply/type of materials
- Heterogenous Materials
 - Nylon, polyethylene, wire, steel, rubber, rope, polystyrene, organic
 - High labour costs associated with segregating and preparing for recycling
 - Ready outlet for prepared materials
- Possible Funding Producer Responsibility Initiative
 - Scale of industry (self funding)
 - Number of players (Producers/Fishermen)
 - Look to leverage existing PRI (e.g. farm plastics, RepakELT ?)
- Enforcement
 - Relatively easy to dump at sea (undetected) for local and international players
 - · Level playing field
- Current demand for recycled materials
 - Business case versus new material




