I. Intra-EU labour mobility



Free Movement of Persons in the EU

Art 21 TFEU gives all EU CITIZENS the right to move and reside freely, including non-active persons, pensioners, students (subject to restrictions in secondary legislation)

Free Movement of Workers (Art 45 TFEU)

Key Figures



- 9,8 million economically active third-country nationals living in the EU
- 8.5 million economically active EU citizens living in another MS in 2015 (3.7% of total labour force in EU)
- 25% of EU citizens would definitely (8%) or probably (17%) consider working in another EU country in the next ten years
- 1.3 million frontier workers (20-64 years)
- 1.9 million posted workers



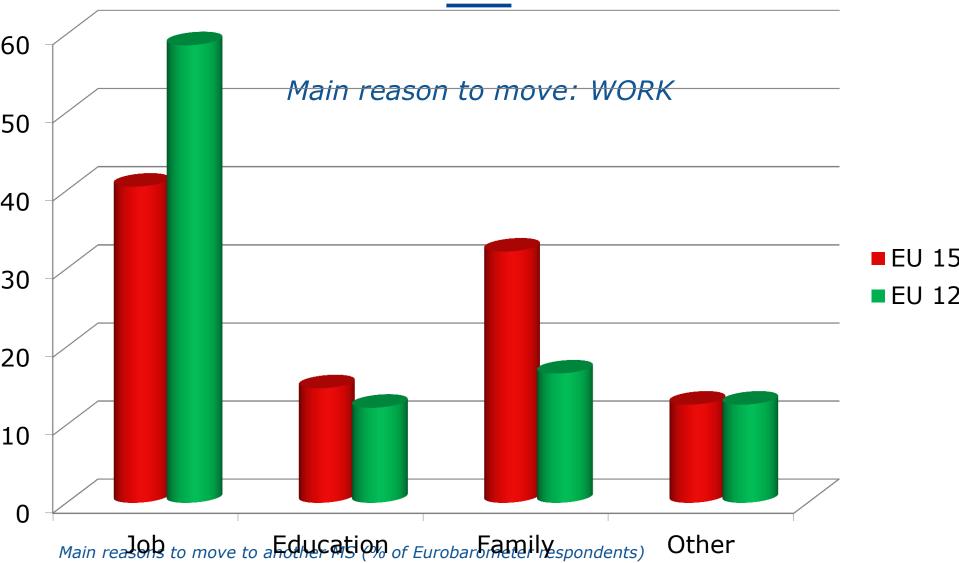

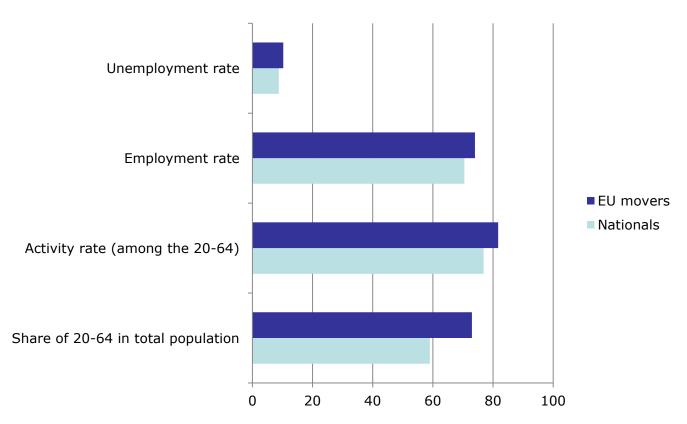

The concept of migrant/mobile worker

- Cross-border element: nationals of one EU Member State who leave their country of origin and go to work to another Member State; not persons who have never left their country of origin
- Also: those who return after having exercised their right to free movement
- **Worker:** person who (i) undertakes genuine and effective work (ii) under the direction of someone else (iii) for which he is paid (Case C-66/85 Lawrie-Blum).



EU citizens can:

- look for a job in another EU country
- work there without needing a work permit
- reside there for that purpose
- stay there after employment has finished
- enjoy equal treatment with nationals in access to employment, working conditions and all other social and tax advantages
- As workers be joined by family members who have derived rights

EURES Regulation



Regulation (EU) 2016/589, in force since 13 May 2016

A **stronger network** of European employment services at EU level that delivers **more efficient labour market information exchange** and **more intra-EU matching**

- Enhanced transparency: more jobs advertised + more CV's available;
- Online multilingual skills-based matching: JV CV;
- An agreed minimum package of services for job seekers and employers in all MS
- A broader network: for more and better services
- Expanded scope: apprenticeships and traineeships
