The Italian Coast Guard is a branch of the Italian Navy, thus is a military administration functionally dependant on the Ministry of Defence and (for main institutional services) on the Ministry of infrastructure and transport and other Ministries (e.g. Environment; Fisheries, etc.). The Coast Guard is a maritime law enforcement administration, being enthrusted with functions of maritime police - according to the Code of Navigation - for all criminal offences forecast by italian maritime laws

### **RECOMMENDED SOLUTIONS**

a) change national law (long and unpredictable process, due to the sovereignity of Parliament);

b) change EU law (long process, possible only on agreed terms between a majority of EU countries) with legal contents allowing single EU countries to share data with EU agencies or with other EU countries on a need-to-know basis: the system would require, however, some changes in national pertinent rules before implementation;

c) signature of ad hoc agreements, or MoUs, between EU member States and concerned EU agencies collecting relevant data, so as to allow the sharing of information for particular purposes (such agreement or MoU should involve each issue pertaining to the information exchange, so as to follow EU rules and guidelines, and would be a much faster process that the change of national or EU laws currently in force).
