From local to the international level: KIMO's Fishing for Litter scheme


- Fishermen collect marine litter caught in nets during normal fishing activity
- The litter is landed in ports, stored, removed and disposed of by the port authorities
- Participation is voluntary and free of charge!
- Started in 2001-2 with 10 ships in the port of
- Den Helder, the Netherlands
- Nowadays: >8 countries, 60 ports, 500 vessels,
 5000+ tonnes of marine litter removed
- The initiative is now included as measure in:
 - OSPAR's Regional Action Plan &
 - EU's Port Reception Facility Directive

Fishing for Litter in Europe

Municipalities for Sustainable Seas MSC Zoe Incident

- Dutch FFL scheme: app. 300 tonnes of Marine litter annually MSC Zoe: thousands of (additional) tonnes of cargo (=litter) lost in northern part of Dutch North Sea
- This poses environmental threats and financial challenges to the environment, municipalities and the Fishing for Litter scheme
- Fishing for Litter could help, but measures and funds needed
- What to do with the cost of the (environmental) damage?
- ⇒ Ship owners and/or European Fund for compensation:
- Civil Liability Convention and International Oil Pollution Compensation Funds, Environmental Liability Directive (ELD)?
